Why is partnering important to state agencies and highway construction projects:

- An <u>International Partnering Institute (IPI)</u> study determined that for every \$1 spent on partnering, there is approximately \$114 in project cost savings. *
- Dramatic reduction in claims and litigation
- Partnered projects often finish on or ahead of schedule and within budget
- Improved issue resolution through stronger, more trusting relationships
